## Student statistical data and activity 2012-13

The University lays out its commitment to equal opportunities within its Equal Opportunities Statement and Code of Practice (<a href="http://www.city.ac.uk/student-administration/equal-opportunities">http://www.city.ac.uk/student-administration/equal-opportunities</a>) covering areas including admissions, assessment, support, curriculum and teaching, appeals, complaints and disciplinary procedures. General oversight of all activities relating to equality and diversity is by the University's Equality Committee which has representation from all parts of the institution including students and key student services.

The University Strategic Plan sets specific milestones for maintaining BME participation at 47% or above (which it has continued to meet) and work stream activity includes projects focused on student retention and student community. The University's Student Community Working Group has a remit to research specific ways in which students identify with institutional communities and to undertake activities to enhance the student community. In 2012-13 these activities included leading on the development of a revised Student Charter.

#### Student policy and procedure

In 2012-13 revisions were made to appeals and extenuating circumstances regulations, policies and supporting information in consultation with students to ensure clarity and accessibility. The Learning & Teaching Operational Plan also lays out plans for a review of student information which has now commenced and will feed into the developing Education & Student Experience Strategy.

A new Student Charter was consulted on by students in 2012-13 and the resulting draft has now been launched for consultation with staff. The proposed new Charter lays out more specific expectations of staff, students and the Students' Union with regard to equality, diversity and fostering community. For example, by specifically outlining the University's responsibilities for groups with protected characteristics and including the Student Union's commitment to advocating for respect and equality.

Boards of Studies are responsible for ensuring student representation and have been supported through the University and Students' Union in increasing the number of student representatives. In 2012-13 the Union also appointed School Representation Officers and approved plans for the appointment of Liberation Officers covering international students, women, LGBT, BME and disabled students as part of the Student Union's Liberation agenda supporting the current and new Student Charter.

#### Support

Support for students with a disability, mental health issues or dyslexia is managed through our Learning Success and Student Counselling and Mental Health teams. In 2012-13 the University employed 7.6 FTE staff disability specialists to support the 1044 students who presented with a disability. This included 189 students offered a comprehensive dyslexia screening and for whom formal Diagnostic Assessments were arranged. Additionally, 2.6 FTE academic learning support staff provided 853 one-to-one support sessions, targeted workshops and on-line resources to support students to fulfil their academic potential. Over 1300 students have enrolled on the on-line module. The University has also committed to establishing new posts in academic learning, dyslexia and disability support to meet rising demand and there are plans to extend these services further,

particularly in relation to working with academic departments on inclusive practice to enhance the skills of staff working with disabled students.

A Lecture Capture policy and supporting guidance has been developed to support the introduction of Echo360 and a number of programme teams are already using this to enable students to review content later and at a different pace.

Approval for the establishment of a Access & Retention role within Student & Academic Services was granted which will support greater evaluation, monitoring and the co-ordination of key activities. Approval of the establishment of a Buddy Scheme co-ordinator within Careers, Student Development and Outreach was granted to support the roll out of the scheme across the University.

#### Monitoring

In 2012-13 City met its target for recruitment from BME groups. Plans have been approved for a regular institutional monitoring report to be submitted to the University's Senate Committee covering progression and achievement for students relating to gender and ethnic background; as a precursor to this the University undertook a deeper analysis of achievement relating to gender and ethnic background. The results have informed plans for further analysis which will be used to establish more monitoring and targets for the success of key groups of students.

Academic appeals and the submission of complaints by students provide a key indicator of any issues being experienced by students. The Appeals & Complaints Forum membership has expanded to include representatives from Learning Success and the Union Support Service. This will enable more joined-up approaches to identifying particular issues for students with protected characteristics and will also facilitate the development of policy, process and local practice recognising diverse student needs. Analysis of data on appeals and complaints received at University level for 2012 did not indicate any significant trends in terms of gender, disability or ethnicity. Students who have declared a disability are slightly more likely to submit a request for review; however, this should be noted in the context of submissions for extenuating circumstances and special examination arrangements which form two of the grounds for appeal. This will be kept under review in 2013-14 and a facility for Schools to undertake analysis of data has also been established to investigate the data further.

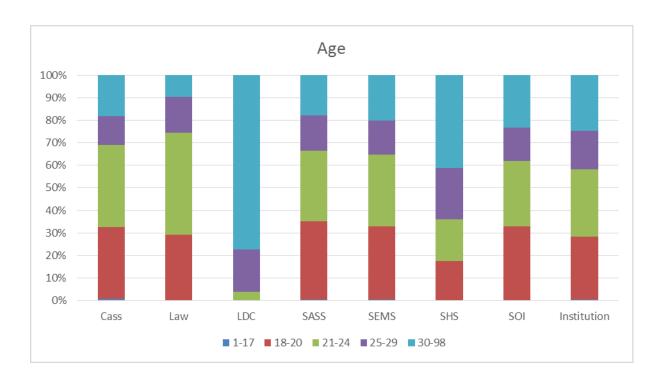
## **Equality statistics**

Age

This data shows that in 2012/13, the School of Health Sciences had a higher proportion of mature students than any other School (excluding the Learning and Development Centre which has a slightly different focus on education than the other parts of the University).

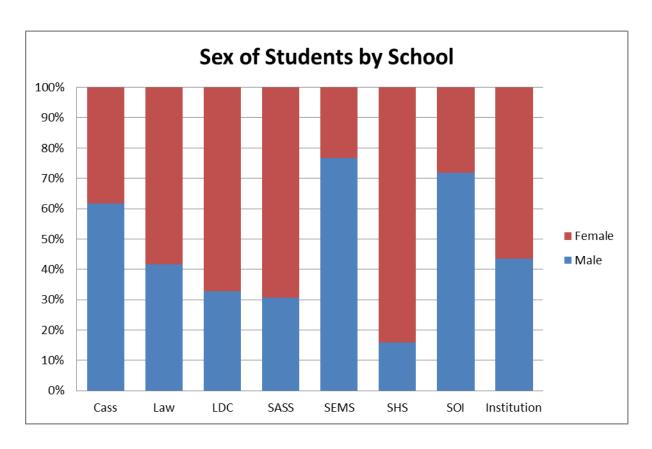

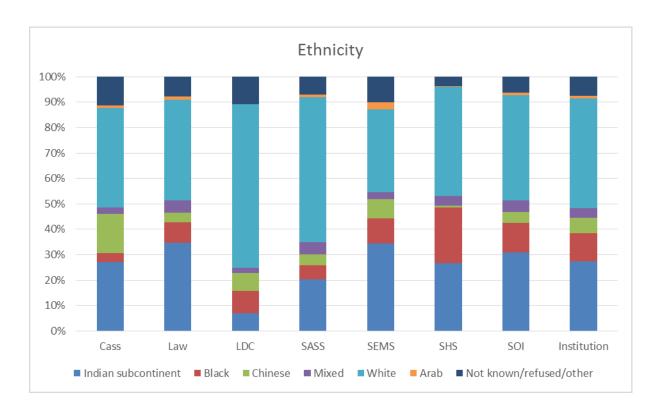
